Mauritius Fire Statistics, 2013

1. Introduction

The Mauritius Fire and Rescue Service (MFRS), formerly known as the Government Fire Services, was set up in 1954. It is a department falling under the aegis of the Ministry of Local Government and Outer Islands.

The Department is headed by the Chief Fire Officer. The main responsibility of the MFRS is to take all necessary steps for the prevention and suppression of fires and the protection of life, property and the environment in case of emergency.

The vision of MFRS is to render the Republic of Mauritius free from fire hazards. The MFRS has 10 fire stations located around the Island (4 in urban and 6 in rural regions) which operate round the clock and can be contacted on the emergency telephone number 115.

To keep pace with increasing demand for statistics for evidence based policy decision, Statistics Mauritius (SM) set up a Statistics Unit at the Department to assist them in developing a statistical data base and providing timely statistical information for improved decision making.

2. Key indicators

This annual report is the first of its kind and statistics provided herein are based on administrative data for 2013 collected by the Control and Mobilising Centre and the Fire Prevention Unit. The report will henceforth be a regular publication of the MFRS and will be available freely on the Department website at fsd.gov.mu as well as on Statistics Mauritius website at statsmauritius.gov.mu

The Control and Mobilising Centre located at the MFRS Headquarters in Port-Louis, receives all incoming emergency calls, dispatches fire crews to incidents and monitors management of operations on incident grounds.

3. Average time taken to reach incident spot


One of the indicators in the Programme Based Budget (PBB) is the time taken to reach an incident spot most particularly in case of structural fires¹ where human life may be at stake. The set target is 12 minutes. This indicator enables one to gauge the efficiency and the effectiveness of the MFRS to promptly respond to an emergency situation. From data obtained with regards to structural fires, it is observed that on average the fire crew takes approximately 8 minutes to reach the location (Table 1). Note that the time taken by each fire station varies due to the area coverage and the ease of accessibility.

4. Fire and rescue service statistics



The number of firecalls (fire incidents dealt with by fire crews) attended by the fire stations in 2013 amounted 10,693. In 71% of cases the Fire and Rescue team were deployed to intervene in various type of fire throughout the country. Special services² and Assistance offered to other agencies³ accounted to 28% and 1% respectively (Table 2).





5. Fire outbreak by Type of Fire



Most (37%) fire incidents occurred in grass lands and sugar cane fields (33%). These fires may be malicious or intentional and requires mobilization of lots of resources to deal with. Residential and non – residential property fires accounted for 8% (Table 4).

The Fire Prevention Unit carries out inspection of buildings, filling stations, fuel depots, gas installations, office and commercial buildings, places of public entertainment, and other premises prone to fire hazards throughout the island for the purpose of fire certification and registration. In addition, the Unit conducts fire safety educational programmes for various categories of target groups, including workers, students and citizens.

6. Applications received and certificates issued

Fire certificate is issued when more than 10 persons are so employed elsewhere than on the ground floor or where highly flammable material is used or stored.

A fire clearance is issued subject that the building satisfies fire safety norms as required by MFRS.

The number of applications received for fire certificate and fire clearance was 2,598 and the number of fire certificates and fire clearance issued summed up to 869 (33%) (Tables 10 & 11).

7. Public education activities



In 2013, the Fire Prevention Section undertook 536 campaigns in connection with fire safety awareness through talks, lectures, demonstrations and broadcast to the population (Table 12).
